Ponderings

Recently I came across an article whose title caught my attention. Appearing in America magazine, the title is “The secret to raising kids that stay Catholic? Family prayer, helping others and hugs.” In previous Ponderings columns we have considered the reality that many ‘grown children’ have an irregular practice of the faith in which they were raised, or they do not practice at all. I have heard the frustrations from parents and grandparents---they go something like this, “I brought them to church every weekend when they were young, now they don’t go at all. What happened?” or “We sent them to Catholic schools---- elementary and high school---and now they don’t go to church. What happened.” or “I was upset they did not get married in church and now they haven’t had the baby baptized? When will they do that?” Perhaps you are one of the parents or grandparents who have expressed your concern in these or similar ways. A couple of years ago we had a “Book Club” where we read a book about children who do not practice the faith. The reality of why someone who had a Catholic upbringing does not practice their faith any longer is a complex reality. There are ‘family influences’ that impact young people and there are ‘cultural influences’ that impact young people. For the most part, the current cultural influences are not leading young people (or any of us) back to church.

So, I was struck by this article. The author presents a few suggestions worthy of our consideration. I don’t think it is a ‘magical, guaranteed, one-size-fits-all’ solution----by some ideas might be appropriated by your family. Being ‘pro-active’ when it comes to raising your child in the catholic faith is a good way to begin. The author begins by saying that a recent study has found that only 15% of children raised in Catholic homes will grow up to be faithful Catholic adults. That statistic, in and of itself, should make us pause, wonder----and spend some time in prayerful reflection.

The Peyton Institute for Domestic Church Life (an apostolate of Holy Cross Family Ministries) worked with the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) to create the Future Faithful Families Project. The study looked at a representative sample of 2,600 Americans, to identify the general characteristics of families that have successfully raised faithful adult kids. They interviewed both parents and faithful adult children from those families. They found that while things like regular Mass attendance, Catholic education, youth ministry and parish involvement were important, they were seen by families as secondary and supportive of the way they lived their faith at home.

What mattered most was a family dynamic in which the family (especially the children) experienced their faith as the source of the warmth in their homes. Children raised in these households experienced their family’s faith as something that drew them together in good times and bad.

They asked families to complete three standardized tests that examined relationship health, religious commitment (i.e., the degree to which their faith was lived in real life) and healthy attitudes toward God. These families scored on the highest ends of these instruments, indicating very healthy relationships, a practical faith, and a healthy attachment to God. The more a family struggles to be happy, healthy, and holy, the more that can benefit by cultivating the habits these families practice, which fall into three categories: relationship, rituals and reaching out.

In general, families who successfully raised all their children to a faithful adulthood were intentional about scheduling regular family time and not letting extracurricular activities squeeze out time for things like family meals, f family day or other important family rituals.

Families were also generously affectionate. Participants often used the word ‘Huggy’ to describe their family dynamic. They created structures to encourage good behavior but did not shame their children for failures or use heavy handed punishments. The adult children interviewed reported feeling ‘listened to’ not ‘lectured.’

Strong family rituals were important—they regularly worked, played, talked, and prayed together. They made a point of having fun together regularly. They reported using screens (tablets, etc.) less often than they saw other families doing. Instead, they played games and did activities together, sometimes daily, but at least weekly.

They prayed together regularly. Many families reported some kind of brief morning time, mealtime, and bedtime prayers. A family rosary was a popular prayer. In addition, these families regularly discussed ways they could be a blessing to others. They encouraged good manners, they cooked for others, some welcomed foster children, they discussed saving money for charitable giving.

Maintenance Update:

Rectory: You may have noticed the rectory has been 'power washed'. It will soon be 'stained'. Our insurance company requires this upkeep. We are evaluating four different proposed solutions for the water in the basement of the rectory when there is a heavy rainfall. We have one sump pump now---but need to add to that.

Church: There are several areas where we have discovered leaks in the roof. Two of them are in the corridor from the church to the parish center. One leak is in the church roof. We have had a couple of companies look at the situation. We are working with them and the insurance company at the present time.

Grounds: Our ten trees (memorials) have survived due in part to the faithful 'watering teams' who have watered them since last May. The base for the statue (Bruges Madonna) is almost complete. It was recommended that a piece of granite be used for the top of the base. That is on order and should be in soon. Later in the Fall, the landscaping crew will descend on the 'wetlands' and clear out all of the growth that is there. We are required to keep those areas clear so that water can flow in and out.

Needless to say, but we are very grateful for your contributions to the Maintenance Collection and your overall generous support of the parish.

The Rectory has been power washed and is ready for staining.
